## June

- 28 Theo van Woerkom is awarded a Canterbury contract. Andrew Hazeldine moves south after being awarded an Otago contract.

## August

- 24 Pre-season training gets underway at the Sir Richard Hadlee Sports Centre.

## September

- 8 Sarah Asmussen, Laura Hughes, Frankie Mackay and Jacinta Savage are awarded a first round contract for Canterbury. Kate Anderson has moved south from Northern Districts and also wins a Canterbury contract.
- 18 The 142<sup>nd</sup> Annual General Meeting is held at the Bealey.
- 24 The Premiership side warms up with a match against the CBHS 1<sup>st</sup> XV.
- 27 Kirsty Nation is awarded a second round Canterbury contact.

## October

- 1 The 2022/23 season gets under way with Premiership, Championship and Premier Women playing.
- 15 First game of the season for the rest of our teams.
- 18 Theo van Woerkom plays for Canterbury v Central Districts in Plunket Shield opener.

- 9 At the 128th New Zealand Cricket AGM, Debbie Hockley completes her term as President and is succeeded by Lesley Murdoch. Catherine Campbell receives Life Membership and Haidee Tiffen is appointed as an honorary member.
- 16 Theo van Woerkom brings up 500 First Class runs for Canterbury when he reaches 31 in Canterbury's 1<sup>st</sup> innings. He finishes with a score of 48.
- 20 Frances Mackay, Jess Simmons, Jacinta Savage, Laura Hughes and Kate Anderson play in the Canterbury Magicians season opener against the Wellington Blaze. It is Anderson's Canterbury debut.
- 26 Kate Anderson scores 35 and Laura Hughes for Canterbury Magicians v Northern Districts Brave. Sarah Asmussen takes 3-35.

## December

- 4 Joey Hull and Harriet Graham are named in the Canterbury under 19 team for the National Tournament at Lincoln.

26 Laura Hughes posts her highest T20 score, 26 for Canterbury Magicians v Wellington Blaze in the Super Smash.

#### January

1 Kate Anderson scores 83\*, her highest T20 score for Canterbury Magicians v Wellington Blaze.

13 Sarah Asmussen's 3-16 for Canterbury Magicians v Northern Districts Blaze is her best T20 bowling.

20 Andrew Ellis plays in the Black Clash for the rugby team, under the guise of the former All Blacks half back.

27 Kate Anderson again posts her highest T20 score with 92\* for Canterbury Magicians v Central Districts Hinds.

#### February

4 On the hottest day of the season, Premier Women play the T20 final against Sydenham. Unfortunately, with representative players out, they finish second.

Kate Anderson scores 74\* for Canterbury Magicians v Otago Sparks in the Super Smash. During the innings she passes 1000 T20 runs.

6 Kate Anderson scores 59 for Canterbury Magicians v Otago Sparks in the Super Smash.

9 Kate Anderson, Laura Hughes and Sarah Asmussen play for Canterbury Magicians v Otago Sparks in the Super Smash elimination final.

Asmussen takes 5-17, her first T20 five wicket bag. Hughes scores 28, her highest T20 score.

11 Kate Anderson, Laura Hughes and Sarah Asmussen play for Canterbury Magicians in their Super Smash victory over Wellington Blaze. Anderson scores 95.

14 Kate Anderson scores 54 and Laura Hughes 30 for Canterbury Magicians v Auckland Hearts.

16 Kalhan Challu, Max Hamilton and Theo van Woerkom are all named in the Canterbury A team to play Otago A.

18 Kate Anderson scores 141\* and Sarah Asmussen takes 5-36 for Canterbury Magicians v Central Hinds. It is Asmussen's first List A five wicket bag and included her 50<sup>th</sup> wicket.

21 Paddy Sullivan plays for New Zealand Over 40 v New Zealand A Over 40.

25 Kate Anderson scores 52 for Canterbury Magicians v Otago Sparks. Sarah Asmussen takes 4-42. Former Lancaster Park player Kate Ebrahim scores 89 for Otago. The following day Ebrahim goes even better with 106\*.

#### March

4 Laura Hughes, Kate Anderson, Jacinta Savage and Sarah Asmussen play in the Halliburton Johnson Shield final against the Wellington Blaze. Jacinta Savage scores 58\* in a narrow loss.

8 Kate Anderson and Sarah Asmussen are named in the South Island squad to take on the North Island.

- 18 LPCC beat Sydenham by 71 runs in the Women's Premiership final. This reinforces their domination of the competition over the last decade.
- 22 Steve Graham is awarded the Sir Richard Hadlee Centre Volunteer of the Week award in recognition of his contribution to women's cricket.
- 23 Kate Anderson wins Ruth Martin Cup for Domestic Women's batting, Super Smash player of the year and Women's Domestic player of the year at New Zealand Cricket awards.
- April
- 4 At the Canterbury Cricket awards, Kate Anderson wins Magicians Batter of the year, Magicians Player of the year, Players' Player of the year and Supporters performance.
- 13 At the CMCA awards evening, Danyaal Khalid wins the John Cowens Award for under 20 Premiership batter of the year.
- Scott Duggan, Danial Khalid, Joey Hull, Katie Midwood, Sarah Parker and Jess Simmons are all selected in the Men's and Women's Premiership teams of the year.

# Obituaries

## Ethna Rowse QSM

29<sup>th</sup> December 1937 - 7<sup>th</sup> June 2023

Ethna's cricketing journey began as a founding member of the Western Women's Cricket Club, where her left-handed batting prowess caught the attention of all who watched her play. Her dedication to the game was unwavering, and her talent shone brightly on the cricketing stage. She represented Canterbury with pride and distinction, donning the white fern in one test and three one-day internationals for New Zealand. Her crowning achievement was being part of the New Zealand team that competed in the 1973 World Cup in England.

Ethna followed her father and her brother into cricket, which she started playing competitively at the age of 12. She represented Canterbury from 1953/54 to 1972/73 playing 46 first class matches, scoring 1350 runs at an average of 22.88 with two centuries. She also added another century in her 9 List A matches.

Ethna gained New Zealand selection late in her career as New Zealand built up to the 1973 World Cup in England. Her first tour was to Australia and South Africa. She played her only test against South Africa at Cape Town on February 25 - 28 1972, scoring 35 in the second innings.

The team won their series in Australia with nine wins and five draws, then went on to win a series of tests in South Africa. They were the first New Zealand woman's Cricket team to achieve this level of

success.

In 1973 she played three matches at the inaugural World Cup, making her top score of 48 against champions England at Exmouth, England's only loss of the tournament.



Aside from representative cricket, Ethna founded the Western Women's cricket club with Shirley Cowles. She was awarded life membership, which was transferred to Lancaster Park cricket club when the two clubs merged in 1976/77. Ethna was also heavily involved in coaching future generations of cricketers.

Aside from Cricket, Ethna also played tennis and cricket. She was a life member of the St Nicholas Netball Club and North Beach Tennis Club. She was an inaugural member of the St Nicholas Netball Club when it was founded in 1950 and was involved as a player, coach and umpire. She was also a life member of the Christchurch Netball Centre.

Ethna received a Christchurch Civic Award in 2002 and was awarded the Queen's Service Medal in the 2004 New Year Honours list, for community services to sport. In 2007 she was named National Winner in the Volunteer Coach of the Year Awards, with recognition of her coaching in cricket, netball and tennis.



## Gavin Royfee

20<sup>th</sup> February 1929 - 10<sup>th</sup> July 2023

Life Member Gavin Royfee played senior cricket for Lancaster Park for 14 years between 1947 and 1961. He played 109 matches, scoring 3884 runs at an average of 26.30 with a high score of 123.

In the 1952/53 season Gavin was selected for three first class matches for Canterbury. He scored 75 runs with a top score of 41 and took one catch. His debut came against Auckland on 16<sup>th</sup> January 1953. He then played against Wellington - a match in which he caught out JR Reid. His final appearance for Canterbury was a draw against the touring South Africans.

Recalling the match against South Africa, Gavin said:

"Murray Chapple made 160-odd and we put on plenty of runs although I ran myself out for 12 so was not very happy with that.

"Then we had them in a lot of trouble at 150-odd for eight but we let them off the hook ..."

At the time of his death Gavin was the 2<sup>nd</sup> oldest first class cricketer in New Zealand, surpassed only by William Crump of Auckland.

Older members will remember playing on pitches prepared by Gavin at the Ensors Road ground, a service he performed for the club until the Polytechnic removed the ground's availability for cricket in the late 1990s.

Apart from cricket, Gavin was an active chorister into his 90s. He attended Cathedral Grammar School and joined the choir at age 8. Later he returned to the school to work as its bursar. As of 2023 he was the Christchurch Transitional Cathedral's oldest chorister.

# Club Captain's Report

It gives me great pleasure to comment on the 2022-23 season.

Our players and supporters, Life members, committee members, funding providers and sponsors must all be acknowledged and thanked for their contribution to our great club.

We were saddened with the passing of Ethna Rouse QSM. Ethna was one of the founding members of the Western Women's Cricket Club which merged with LPCC in 1976-77.

The highlight was our Premier women's team, convincingly winning the One-day title, this being an incredible 7th title in the last 8 years and is a real credit to the team. Batting conditions were tough and it was Jess Simmons with 23 and Laura Hughes 21 that helped post 135. None of the Sydenham batters could get established being dismissed for 65. Wickets were shared amongst Kate Anderson 3/19, Jess 2/12, Caroline Morton 2/7 and Katie Midwood 2/8 for another well-deserved title.

The premier women's one day title aside, the on-field season was extremely tough, I struggle to recall a harder season. Five teams finished last, our Championship, Division 3 and Division 6 teams (Telugu Leaders) and with that comes relegation from the grade. Our Cavaliers T20 side (The Dolphin Guys) finished last but will remain in the grade, whilst our social women's (Park Rangers) T20 team were equal last. Although everyone tried their upmost runs and results were extremely hard to come by.

We welcomed a number of new players and also a new team, playing Division 6 were the Telugu Leaders, captained by Sripathi

Neerukonda and managed by Anirudh Chinni. They were in with a decent chance in the majority of games with their bowling but like a number of teams within the club struggled when batting.

With last year's men's Division 2 team being relegated we had 2 teams in Division 3, the job was made harder leading into the season where we had to rebuild the team. I would like to acknowledge the contribution of Harshana Nanayakkara who returned to the club and assisted me greatly in ensuring we were able to field a team.

With the Christchurch Metro Awards LPCC carried off numerous awards which are noted elsewhere in this publication.

Our club prize giving was held at The Bealey on April 21st with a good turnout of players, Life members, partners and supporters. Our club is enriched by having a visible presence of our Life members and their contribution to our club and I thank you all. Our club would certainly be the poorer without your contribution and presence. One of the highlights of the evening was the boisterous singing of "Happy Birthday" to Life member Jean Ruddenklau, a moment Jean thoroughly enjoyed.

Although all prize winners are recorded elsewhere in this publication the major award winners are as follows. The Wedlake Trophy for "Women's Player of the Year" was awarded to premier player Sarah Parker, with 327 runs.

The Premier men's G Gambles Trophy for "Player of the Year" was claimed by Scott Duggan with 640 runs and 33 keeping dismissals. The

winner of the prestigious Karori Cup for "Club Player of the Year" and the third time he has won this was Tim Corry, playing President's grade, after another stellar season with 812 runs, at an average of 58, 20 wickets and 14 catches.

The Cricketer of the Year award for "Most Valuable Club Member, On and off the Field" was awarded to Premier player Scott Duggan and the Pullar Award for "Outstanding work over the years" was awarded to Aaron Reid.

We saw the reintroduction of Lancaster Park as a cricket ground after such a long hiatus. A number of our teams were fortunate to have the opportunity to play on a ground with such a rich history, not just of cricket but other sports and events. Presidents were the first to play on the ground followed by our Division 3 team. Once the infrastructure is in place our premier teams will also be afforded the same privilege.

Disappointingly the standard of Garrick Park was poor all season, with the ground now maintained by the Council, whilst St Albans Park 2 despite its heavy use with trainings played ok.

Best figures were achieved by Chestfield Warriors Division 3 players Sukhraj Mahal, topping the season's best bowling chart with 6-9 on 221022 whilst Satinder Singh on 101222 smashed an incredible 206. I was in the opposition to see first-hand his incredible innings. Tim Corry, scored two hundreds and was close to another with a 93#.

I applaud the role of all captains and organisers in sourcing players and to those who filled in, often at short notice, thank you. It can often be a thankless task looking for players when teams are short and we need to be able to provide a smoother pathway, including having availability from afternoon

grade players who are capable and wish to play higher. Their also needs to be a better commitment from some teams in regards to integrating within the club, whether in a social or playing capacity.

Chairman Josh Bates deserves a special mention for all his hard work leading our club in a role that requires a lot of commitment. Josh leads a committee that is hard working, where everyone wants to make a difference for the betterment of our club.



Secretary/Treasurer and Presidents captain Richard Derham is the heartbeat of our club who I thank for his continued dedication, commitment and enthusiasm in his numerous roles. Richard plays and captains our Presidents team. Richard is superb in firing off grant applications and has a decent success rate in sourcing funds in what has been challenging times.

The club prize-giving, really

reinforced what a great, supportive and committed group of women we have and they have been for a long time now. Patron Bruce summed it up nicely when emotionally he shed a tear speaking about how enriched we are to have a great supportive women's section and what they contribute to our club. They have a fantastic culture and a number of people have contributed greatly and have led this over the years. I would also like to recognise the efforts of Zoe Pullar and her enormous contribution over a number of years, not just for the women's section but our whole club. Thank you, Zoe.

I am extremely proud to be associated with our club and look forward with confidence to the 2023-24 season. Based on playing performances this season, with renewed dedication and vigour and a lot of hard work during, the rewards will come, as we set about turning around our on-field performances.

# Men's Coaching Report

2022/23 was another great year at St Alban's Park. We were treated again to some brilliant performances, great wins and as always a fantastic feel of camaraderie. 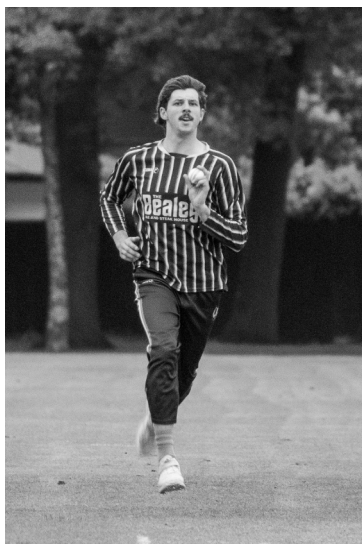

# Championship report

The 2022/23 season was one of many ups and downs for the Championship Men's side. We boasted a large group of young, up and coming cricketers who were welcomed in by our ever-reliable experienced players in the group. We witnessed some fantastic individual success, which unfortunately couldn't lead to any silverware.

This season started with the two-day competition, where we found ourselves in commanding positions, however just couldn't convert these into outright wins. Our first match was against Merivale-Papanui, and we grabbed a first innings lead of 15 thanks to Simon Gallop and Jordan Herbert, with 4 wickets a piece. We then posted a target of 160 for them to get in 55 overs, however couldn't break partnerships when they formed and ultimately went down with 3 overs remaining and 3 wickets to get.

We then came up against Sydenham, where yet again we held a first innings lead thanks to a classy 5 wicket bag from Simon Gallop and were looking good for an outright win. A strong showing with the bat, led by Cameron Tabb with 83, set them 220 to get in 40 overs. An innings of brute hitting from some very experienced opposition saw this target chased in just 33 overs.

Next up, OBC. Debutant, Harry Forrest stepped up for a fantastic 6/36 off 13 overs which was one of the performances of the season in my opinion. Unfortunately, this didn't give us a first innings lead as

we experienced one of our 'famous' collapses, which is something that has cost us dearly in my 2 seasons at the club. However, some great fight was shown by our bowling and fielding attack to force a result out of the game. We were set 240 in just under 70 overs, which was absolutely achievable on a small Elmwood Park #4. Every single batter in the top 9 made starts and reached double digits, but no one pushed through to a match winning score, which ultimately saw us lose by an agonising 5 runs.

Our final two-day match for the first half of the season saw us matched up against newcomers to the grade, Halswell. Little was known about this team, but we were confident that if we played to our strengths, we would be able to register our first win of the season. Yet again, we lost wickets in clumps and were bowled out for 133 before lunch. With the weather looking fairly average for day 2, we knew how important a first innings win would be in determining the overall result of this match. Our pace attack came out and bowled aggressively, which was complimented well by our spin trio. A last wicket partnership of roughly 30 saw Halswell grab the first innings win and as expected we were washed out on day 2.

A disappointing 8 weeks to start our campaign with nothing to show for some really special individual and team performances.

Next up was the T20 competition, where we set out to defend our title from last season. We started on a dark Thursday night against

Burnside. We took this match to the final over and up step Simon Gallop to defend 6 runs and kickstart our season. 2 wickets and just 3 runs saw us win by 2, and we found ourselves on the right side of the result finally!

This was a sign of things to come as we moved into our first Saturday double-header against St Albans and Sumner. Two very convincing wins where we restricted them to 58 and 82 respectively, thanks to an all-round fantastic team bowling performance where every bowler in our attack took wickets.

The next mid-week match saw us up against Merivale-Papanui, where we batted first and posted 152, thanks to contributions of 41 from Mitch Rodden, and 38 from Simon Gallop, we then bowled as we did in the previous weekend and restricted them to just 64.

At this point we were sitting in a prime position to make the final and defend our crown in this competition, this was until we were met by the two other top teams, Sydenham and OBC on the same day. Winning one of these two matches would have seen us secure a finals position, however things went pear shaped when Sydenham came out firing. They batted first and posted what was considered a well above par, 159, to which we had no real go forward and slumped to just 106. In the afternoon against OBC, we decided to bat first as Sydenham had, but we never got going and lost regular wickets to post just 80 all out. OBC then came out swinging and it came off with them chasing our total in very quick time, while Simon Gallop took 4/47 as our only contributor with the ball.

These two losses had hurt our chances at the final significantly, but it wasn't impossible. We came up against Halswell and needed to have a massive win to have any chance of making the final. We

bowled first in this match in hope that we could be set a total and then know exactly how fast we needed to chase them down in order to get our net run rate up above the others. We bowled very tightly with what was a very young attack, where myself at 20 years old was the oldest bowler! They posted us 125 which was a lot more than what we had hoped for and this meant that we had to chase this total in around 8 overs. Achievable, but very difficult, in tough conditions and fading light. Unfortunately, we just couldn't find it in ourselves and were bowled out for 87.

A T20 competition that looked so promising but ended in a large array of disappointment across the group.

We then began our One Day campaign, with our eyes set at going one better than last season, and finally win that title. We started against a strong Burnside outfit, who put us under pressure early with the ball. They posted 252 on a nice track, which we knew could be chased if someone was to put their hand up and score big. Unfortunately, we lost wickets in clumps and were eventually bowled out for 142, a tough loss to begin a hopeful competition.

Next up was St Albans, a pivotal match that would at the time, set us up for a good crack at finals footy. We batted first on a superb wicket at the Hagley Nursery ground and posted 251, with plenty of 30s and 40s scored by our top order. We then bowled and fielded with the most discipline we had seen all season and halted St Albans from the get-go and bundled them out for just 91. A notable moment from this match was Josh Bates taking the final wicket in Ross Taylor like fashion with some very questionable off spin.

We then ventured out to St Leonards Square to take on

Sumner. We batted first and were looking set for a great score at around 120/2, with Archie Reekie scoring 51, his first half century for the club, at the top of the order. Things then took a turn for the worse and we lost regular wickets and fell to 160 all out. We bowled very well without reward, which basically summed us up on the day, eventually falling to a 7-wicket loss.

A must win match was up next against Merivale-Papanui, where again we were sent in to bat first on what looked like a really nice wicket. To our surprise, it was very two-paced and difficult early. We managed well with small partnerships which took us to 170. Again, to our surprise, the pitch seemed to have flattened out completely by the afternoon, and our tidy bowling was made to look relatively average at times and missed chances in the field really hurt us and we fell to a 5-wicket loss.

Certainly not an ideal first half of the competition, however we definitely had our times of domination, but never seemed to capitalise on these moments.

Our match against Sydenham was abandoned. Next up was OBC, one of the stronger sides in the Championship competition this season, and 10 players and 32 degrees of heat weren't going to help us out in any way. We were taken back by some blistering power from some of the OBC batsmen, which set them up to an impressive total of 316. At the break, we knew that we had the ability to chase this total on what was a very nice pitch. It started brilliantly, led by Harry Forrest, with 75 at the top of the order. We were in for a good shot at a remarkable chase when the odds were against us from ball one. We continued to chip away at the total, however we again lost a few too many wickets at bad times, and with some smaller partnerships we were to end on 260

all out. A match of great character by our men in some very challenging conditions and circumstances.

Our final one-dayer was against Halswell. We sent them into bat on what looked like a bowler-friendly wicket. Halswell started against the new ball slowly, and our bowlers made the ball talk consistently without reward. They then settled in and built partnerships and were cruising to set a score of 240+. This was until Josh McCarthy found some magic and took 5/40, which restricted them to 204. The chase started out quickly with runs flowing but wickets also falling regularly, which continued throughout the innings with Cam Tabb the exception who watched 9 wickets fall at the other end. Because of him, the game was made close, but in the end, we fell 7 runs short. This innings of 69 of 132 balls from Cam was one of true determination and desire to help the team to succeed, and without it we would have fallen well short of the target.

To finish the season, we had 3 two-day matches, all of which were extremely important in determining the overall success of our season.

We were unable to gain anything against Burnside after a washed out second day saw the match end in a draw. We then came up against St Albans in what was an extremely pivotal match. We were sent into bat in what looked like some very interesting conditions and never really found any momentum and were eventually bowled out for just 115. We had a huge task ahead to pull this match back and the bowling unit rose to the occasion and came out firing. We took regular wickets while restricting the runs and ended up bowling them out for just 82, with every bowler contributing in some way. We then had the opportunity to set them a competitive total, but like the first innings, we didn't get going and lost

regular wickets to fall to just 108. This meant that we had 142 to defend. We were able to restrict the scoring rate early but failed to take regular wickets that would put any real pressure on them. We had a late flurry of wickets courtesy of Nick Cooke with 5/36, which tightened the game up, but it was too little too late, and they snuck past to win by just 2 wickets.

This set up a must win final match against Sumner to avoid relegation, something we were absolutely capable of. We won the toss and bowled first as a tactic of being able to control the result of the game better. The plan started extremely well with regular wickets being taken and not many runs being scored against us. We were set up to bowl them out for under 120 which would have been a fantastic result, but we let them form a late partnership which saw them reach 168. We then found ourselves in some serious trouble early with the

bat but managed to steer our way to a poor, but not match ending 105. The task from here was to bowl them out as quickly as possible and then to chase this total. We managed a few early wickets which saw us right in the hunt, however they formed two really strong partnerships which forced the match to a draw. A disappointing end to the season, but it certainly didn't come without a large amount of effort and determination.

Overall it was a season full of ups and downs, with a lot of promise shown in what is a much younger group of players than previous years. We have continued to grow better week by week and I am already looking forward to going again next season!

Qaiser Rashid showed a calm mature head at the top of the order that the team really valued and some great shots to go with it. Chandhi, when he got going was our most consistently dangerous batsman and was one of two (the other was Ravisankar) to raise their bats to our adoring fans this season, he often carried a high percentage of the runs when we did make good totals and we relied heavily on his contributions. Jean Cronje and Ravi Rawat continue to develop, and both had a couple of really high-quality knocks in the middle order that show the promise for next season.

While our final standings were disappointing, we finished stone cold last, I was really impressed by how much we felt like a team by the end of the season. We opened the season at Elmwood Park against Old Boys Collegians. Batting first, Richard Derham and Leighton Evans combined for a 77 run partnership but there were no other real partnerships and we were all out for 117, which OBC knocked off 4 down.

In week two we had the privilege of hosting Ohoka at Lancaster Park for club cricket's return after 25 years. We won the toss and decided to have a bowl. Ohoka started steadily, going to drinks at 75/1. Having plenty of wickets in the bank they looked to be aggressive for the second 20, the first ball after the break heading over the boundary. Richard Derham decided it was time to have a bowl and ended the innings with 5-26.

220 was a good score on a new deck and we knew it would require some chasing.

A Tim Corry century with 8 sixes and 10 fours was just what was required and partnerships of 84 between Tim and Leighton Evans then 66 between Tim and Richard Derham got us the bulk of the way there. Tim was finally dismissed with 4 required and Rob Genet and Stace Styles got us there in the last over.

Garrick Park against St Albans. After St Albans decided to bat we made a good start, keeping them to 14 runs off the first 10 overs. After drinks though, the batters took the long handle to the bowling and Saints got through to 182/6, which seemed a good score on a poppy pitch. Tim Corry fought hard with 41 but unfortunately we folded for 95.

Next up was a trip to the seaside to take on Sumner. Sumner elected to bat on a hard and fast St Leonard's pitch.

Darron Reekers opened up for Sumner but the innings started innocuously enough, with the runs ticking over at about 4 to 5 an over. However, before long things started to accelerate, with the runs flowing freely through chance-less hitting into the gaps no matter where the field was set, not just from Reekers, but his opening partner Julian Marsh too. Reekers had a hundred before drinks, as Sumner saw out the first 20 with the score on about 170.

Several of us moved our cars at drinks - just as well as things only got worse from there as the onslaught continued. We finally found the breakthrough with the score on 248, with Marsh hitting a full toss back to Carter Genet, 17 short of a deserved ton.

Reekers had his eye on 200, and the boundaries kept flowing no matter what the bowlers and fielders tried. Richard Derham had both the ignominy of being the bowler against whom Reekers brought up his double ton, and the joy of being the man to remove him two balls later, with a tidy catch taken by Stace Styles on the square leg boundary.

400+ was never realistic and with just one partnership of substance between Tim and Leighton we were all out for 137 after about 30 overs.

After a week off for Show Weekend and a rain out, Burnside Foxes travelled to Lancaster Park. We

were asked to bat first on a very soft & spongy deck and we quickly found batting difficult.

Richard Derham scored 10 in 27 overs and Wayne Derham (20\*) and Stace Styles (22\*) had a hit at the end to reach 81/8 from our full 40 overs. Burnside didn't find it so hard, knocking off the runs in the 9th over.

First up in the new year was Burnside Robbies at St Albans Park. We restricted them to 167 with Stace Styles taking 4-45. When their key bowler Nathan Columbus broke down in the first over of our reply it looked like we were in with a good chance. Unfortunately we struggled to get a big partnership going and fell short by 29 runs.



In the run in to Christmas we suffered a heavy loss to East Shirley Strikers, their first win of the season, and to a weakened East Shirley Black thanks to a century from their Skipper Murray Seaton - batting with a broken rib thanks to the pace of Wayne Derham. The last game before the break was a technical win as Marist Harewood withdrew from the competition.

Merivale-Papanui were next on a low and slow wicket at Edgar Macintosh 2. MP batted first and were 12-3 early on, including a stunning catch by Ben McBride. We were on top at 65-5 at drinks. A couple of useful partnerships got them through to 132. The chase began promisingly with a 46 run second wicket partnership between Richard and Tim. Unfortunately by drinks we were 65-4. Wickets

continued to fall after drinks and we looked out of it at 115/8. Rob Genet and Wayne Derham did their best with overs and wickets running out but on the end we were bowled out for a 7 run loss.

With a run of frustrating losses we headed to Hillsborough Domain to play the Heathcote Tunnel Rats. The Hillsborough track could best be described as "spicy" possibly verging on "spiteful".

After winning the toss Heathcote were invited to bat. The total after 40 overs was 146/9, which looked to be a healthy score given the conditions.



Things were looking a bit dicey when we were 3/2 in the 5th over, however that was it as Leighton Evans and Tim Corry combined to knock off the remaining 144 runs for our first victory since October. It was by no means a chance-less partnership - such a thing would be impossible on that track - but they worked out a method that worked, waiting for the ball to get to the top

of its bounce and hitting it from there. Tim finished on 93\* and Leighton 50\*.

The 4th of February was the hottest day of the season and we played Sydenham Hospital on Sydenham No. 3. After 15 overs and the first drinks break, Hospital were in trouble on 28/3 and Park had just bowled 5 consecutive maidens. At 46/4 after 22 overs things were looking good for us. Unfortunately Hospital managed to increase their scoring rate, reaching 165/9.

Wayne Derham bowled an outstanding spell of 8-5-5-2. Tim and Leighton again provided the bulk of our batting but after they were both dismissed we collapsed from 108/4 to 166 all out.

After a bye, we took a bit of a hiding from Burnside Foxes at Burnside, the game once again ending in a rapid collapse from our batting lineup.

This signalled the end of the main competition and the grade now split into separate top 6 and bottom 7 sections. Needless to say we found ourselves in the bottom 7.

We opened the competition against the Shirley Strikers on neutral territory at Parklands Reserve after a wet week put grass pitches out across the city. Shirley's only win of the season had come against us before Christmas but they soon had their second. The Strikers are proving to be a real bogey team for us. In their three years in the grade most other teams don't seem too troubled by them but they beat us every time. Kerry Simpsons 4-20 represented his best bowling performance of the season.

Into March we headed to back to Edgar Macintosh Park to play Merivale Papanui. Batting first, we only managed two double figure scores but thankfully those scores were 83 from Tim supported by 37



from Leighton and we reached a defendable 160. We followed this up with our best bowling and fielding performance of the season, ripping them out for 95. Which could have been much worse if not for Pickle carrying his bat for 53\*. All of the bowlers came to the party but of particular note was Josh Cvantovich bowling his 8 overs straight through for 2-15. Ben McBride produced another ripper of a catch, something he saves for Merivale Pap.

A visit to Mandeville is always a highlight, with it's beautiful country setting and catered afternoon tea. Unfortunately Ohoka brought us crashing back down to earth, posting 234 and then dismissing us for 129. Once again the only partnership of note came from Tim and Leighton. Rishbah Nangpal filled in for us from Division 3 and particularly impressed the Ohoka side bowling three with googleys and taking four wickets in all.

Our penultimate game saw us return to Sydenham Park to play the Cardinals. Batting first, the innings was dominated by Tim Corry, who scored 108\* out of our total of 169. The trees to the south of Sydenham 3 took a bit of a battering. Some reckless batting by the Cardinals top order saw us right in the game but unfortunately the lower middle order knuckled down to the task and sensibly completed their chase.

Just like that we were up to the final match of the season, hosted by the Tunnel Rats at Hillsborough domain. Unfortunately weather conditions were moist and the sodden pitch played like a sponge cake. Heathcote won the toss and elected to bat but the going proved to be slow as we strung together spells of accurate medium pace and spin bowling. At the 20 over mark the score was 45/2 and in the second half although it accelerated slightly we continued to bowl accurately and didn't let things get

away. Wickets were shared around between Stace, Tim and the Derhams. Kerry Simpson bowled tightly without success as the captain dropped his 4th catch in a row. A visit to the optometrist will be forthcoming.



In response, things were looking comfortable while Leighton and Tim were together. Even when Leighton went out and we lost another couple of wickets Tim was still there! Then with 22 required Tim's attempt at another 6 fell a bit short and he was out for 56. Suddenly it dawned on the Tunnel Rats that our famously fragile tail was exposed and they got very keen! Things were a bit tense, the pitch was absorbing any pace from the ball, the ball itself was wet, soft and dark and the light was quickly fading. Our resident Hungarian, Robbie Toth, played his most valuable innings (a quick 7 including a bludgeoned 4) then Stace joined Richard and the experienced heads did the job with

just 8 balls and 3 wickets to spare.

Tim Corry was a much deserved winner of the player of the year and batter of the year prizes (and indeed the over-all club player of the year). 812 runs, 20 wickets and 14 catches was a huge contribution to the team. Particularly impressive was his run into the end of the season as he plundered 295 runs in the last month.



Leighton Evans provided the other half of our dependable batting partnership. Leighton scored 430 runs, the majority of them with Tim at the other end.

Stacey Styles was the top wicket taker for the team and deservedly won the bowling cup. After taking just 4 wickets before the mid season break he claimed another 24 in the new year. Not that he had been bowling poorly - it's just that cricket is a funny old game.

Wayne Derham gave another season of steady service with ball in hand. The statistic he most cares about is his 21 maidens but he also

contributed 17 wickets.

Richard Derham's season highlights came early with his high score in game one and a 5-for in game two. Third in the runs and fourth in the wickets means he is some sort of all-rounder. Hopefully vision issue can be rectified in the off season.

Robbie Toth continued to develop his cricket experience. In the nets he showed that he can really smash a ball and played a very valuable cameo in the win in the final match.

Kerry Simpson was in his best bowling form so far. His control over length especially has really tightened up from where he was a couple of years ago. Kerry has claimed responsibility for keeping the scoreboard up to date.

Josh Cvantovich joined the team during the season and quickly fitted in with his sunny, friendly

personality. His bowling made a massive contribution to our win against Merivale Papanui.

Preston and Carter Genet both filled in for several matches when called upon by their dad. Thanks for helping out!

Stu Kelly joined the team after many years away from the club. Early signs were that he was going to be a key member but the old Stu Kelly injury curse soon struck and he only got through three games. Hopefully Stu will be back in the future.

Thanks also to those who were willing and able to fill in for a game or two - Chris Bostock, Jonathan Crosby, Reuben Derham, Rahul Goip, Ashley Harvey, Jesse Hot, Jeremy Lidstone, Alex Milnes, Rishabh Nangpal, Hard Narang, Viraj Rao and Qaiser Rashid.





# Statement of Accounting Policies

## Lancaster Park Cricket Club Inc For the year ended 30 June 2023

### Basis of Preparation

The entity has elected to apply PBESFR-A(NFP) Public Benefit Entity Simple Format Reporting - Accrual (Not-For-Profit) on the basis that it does not have public accountability and has total annual expenses equal to or less than \$2,000,000. All transactions in the Performance Report are reported using the accrual basis of accounting. The Performance Report is prepared under the assumption that the entity will continue to operate in the foreseeable future.

### Goods and Services Tax (GST)

The entity is registered for GST. All amounts are stated exclusive of goods and services tax (GST) except for accounts payable and accounts receivable which are stated inclusive of GST.

### Income Tax

Lancaster Park Cricket Club Inc is wholly exempt from New Zealand income tax having fully complied with all statutory conditions for these exemptions.

### Bank Accounts and Cash

Bank accounts and cash in the Statement of Cash Flows comprise cash balances and bank balances (including short term deposits) with original maturities of 90 days or less.

### Revenue Recognition

Revenue from providing goods or services:  
Revenues recorded when the goods or services are provided.

Fees, subscriptions and other revenue from members:  
Income from members is recognised as revenue upon issue of annual subscriptions invoice in the period to which it relates. Any fees or subscriptions received in advance of the period in which it relates are recorded as a liability.

Donations, grants and other similar revenue:  
If there are no 'use or return' conditions attached to the donation or grant the revenue is recognised when the cash is received. If there are 'use or return' conditions attached to the donation or grant the funds received are recorded as a liability. As the conditions are met the liability is reduced and revenue is recorded.

### Inventory

Inventories are measured at cost. The cost of inventories includes expenditure incurred in acquiring the inventories and other costs incurred in bringing them to their existing location and condition.

### Fixed Assets and Depreciation

All fixed assets are recorded at cost less accumulated depreciation.  
The club's asset classes are depreciated by the following rates:  
Plant and Equipment - 16% to 67% DV  
Motor Vehicles - 30% DV  
Office Equipment - 50% DV

### Changes in Accounting Policies

There have been no changes in accounting policies. Policies have been applied on a consistent basis with those of the previous reporting period.
